Agriculture Safety AGR3000	None	Working on a farm or at a feedlot is tough work. But it's a whole lot easier when you know how to stay safe. In this course, you'll explore workplace safety principles and practices pertaining to agriculture. Whether you're working or living on a farm or just visiting for the weekend, safety is fundamental to getting all you can out of the experience.	1
Career And Life Management - No Sexuality PED0770	None	Explore the various steps of personal development, and equip yourself with the necessary skills to make healthy, well-informed decisions and choices throughout your life. Note: This version of the course doesn't address human sexuality topics, but does include some mature content.	3
Companion Animals AGR2045	None	Are you an animal lover? You'll love them even more—and understand them better—once you've had the chance to explore the history, physiology, behavior, health and welfare, care, and husbandry of a variety of companion animal species.	1
Criminal Law LGS3080	None	What rights does someone who's been arrested have? What's expected of someone attending a court appearance? What's up with jury duty? What's a suspended sentence? Find the answers to these questions, and more, in LGS3080. Examine the criminal justice system and become familiar with criminal justice processes and the roles and responsibilities of participants in the system.	1
Environmental Law LGS2030	None	Do you have a passion for saving the environment? Today, most of us recognize that we need to make changes if our environment is to be preserved for future generations. But relatively few of us understand much about environmental law as it exists in Canada today. Forensic Studies 35 LDC3569 or LDC3754	Forensic Studies 25	Take your knowledge of crime scene investigation further as you learn about forensic anthropology, entomology, and toxicology; ballistics; police protective equipment; police dogs; arson investigation; and criminal profiling. Analyze real-life crime cases, including the Romanov remains, the Washington sniper shootings, Clifford Olson, Ted Bundy, and Jeffrey Dahmer. *Note: Forensic Science 35 (5 credit) is an expanded version of this 3-credit course. You can earn credits in only one of the two courses. Warning: Due to the graphic nature of the course material and its focus on real events, this course may not be suitable for everyone. This course includes descriptions of violent crimes, firearms, and deviant behaviour.	3 or 5
Forest Research & Development FOR3080	None	There's more to saving a forest than just planting a tree. In this course, you'll learn about the development of forest resources and the need for continued research. You'll also learn about the major components of research plans and how research activities are currently coordinated in Alberta.	1
Forest Use & Protection FOR1100	None	Take a walk in the woods! In this course, you'll learn about past and present forest development. You'll also explore some of the major conservation methods involved in the sustainable development of forests and research career options for forest management.	1

Forests & Society FOR1010	None	Why are forests so important to us? In this course, you'll learn about the social, economic, and environmental significance of forests. You'll also explore the impact that society and individuals have on our forests and discover how forests have been used historically by Indigenous peoples and European and Asian settlers.	1

In this course, you'll begin with an idea for a business venture then follow the process for turning that concept into reality. Along the way, you'll study the laws related to starting a business, operating a business, and—if need be—closing a business. Sport & Society REC3140	None	How does sport impact society and vice versa? Explore the answer to this question as you investigate the structure and function of community, amateur, and professional sport organizations and examine the role and structure of sport in society.	1
